

Advent 4C Today's readings highlight what for me is the essence of Christianity: That Jesus came to save us, particularly the lowly, downtrodden and insignificant – that is, you and me. Sometimes I think we (and the powers that be in all aspects of life) place too much emphasis on who we are, where we fit in society and how important someone (us included) might be. Jesus and Mary both epitomise the humblest of origins, insignificant in the wider world. We should remember this – we have been chosen by God to represent his values on this earth and live our lives to be an example of his love.

Christmas Day David in Psalm 98 tells us to use our voice to 'sing a new song' and our music to praise and give thanks to God. This is how we can show our gratitude to God for all the gifts he has given us. Today we celebrate God's best and wonderful gift to us in Jesus.

How can you use your gift to 'shout with joy' to the Lord?

Give thanks for the gift of music to sing our song of joy and the freedom to do it.

Give thanks for the work and witness of the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, remembering the Christian communities, primarily Greek Orthodox, Armenian Apostolic, and Roman Catholic, in that city.

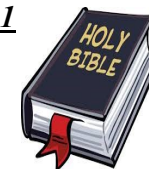
