


**4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of EASTER - GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY and ANZAC DAY 25th April 2021**

**Anzac Biscuit Crumble Slice**

600g packet caramel mud cake mix  
2 eggs  
¼ cup vegetable oil  
110 gm (approx. 4 x Coles Bakery Anzac biscuits crumbled

¼ cup rolled oats  
¼ cup shredded coconut  
20g butter  
1 Tbspn brown sugar



Pre heat oven to 180C. Grease slice pan and line base & sides with baking paper. Prepare the cake mix using eggs, oil and 2/3 (160ml) water following packet directions. Pour into the prepared pan.

Place biscuits, oats, coconut, butter and sugar in a bowl. Use fingertips to rub the butter into the biscuit mixture until just combined. Sprinkle the mixture evenly over the cake batter.

Bake for 30 – 35 minutes. Set aside in pan for 15 minutes to cool slightly before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

*You can make it as a cake. Follow all instructions but use a 20 cm, base cake tin and bake for 1 hour.*

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## THE LEPROSY MISSION AUSTRALIA



At the service on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> June 2021, Janet Marshman of *The Leprosy Mission Australia* spoke to us about this far from eliminated disease which still affects some 300,000 people worldwide. In fact, one person is diagnosed with leprosy every two minutes(!) We were rather stunned to hear that thirty-eight countries *still have legislation* to cast lepers out from society.



Janet became committed to the *Leprosy* cause following a 9-day trek in Nepal, where there is a large Leprosy Research Centre.

The trek was her introduction to the prevalence of the disease, and amongst her slides we saw confronting images of people, young and old, with missing limbs.

On the positive side, Janet described watching surgery over the years transferring tendons on a person's hands, which used to take two hours – now they can do it in 20 minutes. In some people, multi drug therapy can stop the disease progressing within 24 hours; in others the drugs have no impact and patients suffer ongoing disease. Happily, great progress has been made treating chronic ulcers. Researchers have discovered that spinning blood taken from a patient and applying it directly to their ulcer, can heal the ulcer within a few weeks, whereas previously people have ulcers for years. Leprosy is a disease of poverty and as might be expected the Covid pandemic has impacted significantly on funding. The parish responded generously to this worthy cause and over \$200 was raised via a collection and sale of items in the hall at morning tea after the service.

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## VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC DAY REMEMBRANCE

Plympton and Glenelg RSL, Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> August 2021



Victory in the Pacific Day, also referred to as VJ (Victory over Japan) Day commemorates Japan's World War II unconditional surrender to the allies on the 15<sup>th</sup> August 1945, after more than three years of war. Sometimes overlooked as we remember the Gallipoli campaign in World War I, the war in Europe, and the Battle of Tobruk in the Middle East in World War II, VP Day is a time for us to reflect on the vital role Australians played in defeating the Japanese and ending conflict in the Pacific region. On Sunday 15.8.21, about thirty-five people took part in a remembrance service at Plympton and Glenelg RSL, including CHOGS parishioner Harold Bates-Brownsword who acted as bugler.
